

Chhattisgarh's Tiger Population Doubles in 3 Years | Chhattisgarh | 11 Sep 2025

Why in News?

Chhattisgarh's tiger population has significantly increased, **doubling from 17 in 2022 to 35** by April 2025, highlighting the state's successful wildlife conservation efforts.

 This growth was highlighted at the 15th meeting of the Chhattisgarh State Wildlife Welfare Board, chaired by Chief Minister Vishnu Deo Sai.



Key Points

- **About:** <u>Achanakmar Tiger Reserve</u> hosts the highest tiger population at 18, followed by <u>Guru Ghasidas-Tamor Pingla (GGTP) Tiger Reserve</u> with 7, <u>Indravati Tiger Reserve</u> with 6, <u>Bhoramdeo Wildlife Sanctuary</u> with 3, and <u>Udanti-Sitanadi Tiger Reserve</u> with 1.
 - The GGTP, declared India's 56th tiger reserve in 2024, is now the third-largest in the country, after Nagarjunasagar-Srisailam Tiger Reserve in Andhra Pradesh and Manas Tiger Reserve in Assam.
- Translocation Plan: Chhattisgarh has received approval from the National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA) to translocate tigers from Madhya Pradesh to the Udanti-Sitanadi and Guru Ghasidas-Tamor Pingla Tiger Reserves.
 - A total of five tigers, including two females and one male tiger for Udanti-Sitanadi and three males for Guru Ghasidas, will be relocated.
- Tiger Conservation Plan (TCP): The state has nearly finalized a comprehensive Tiger
 Conservation Plan (TCP) aimed at addressing challenges related to habitat management and boosting tourism in the tiger reserves.
 - This plan also focuses on enhancing facilities in the **Kanger Valley National Park** to increase tourist footfall and provide livelihood opportunities for local communities.



Countries Where Tiger Population Is Found

□ Found only in 13 Tiger Range countries- India, Nepal, Bhutan, Bangladesh, Myanmar, Russia, China, Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, Cambodia, Laos, and Vietnam

As per the latest report by IUCN, tiger has gone extinct in Cambodia, Laos, and Vietnam

Conservation Efforts

- International Big Cats Alliance (IBCA): For conservation of seven big cats namely Tiger, Lion, Leopard, Snow Leopard, Cheetah, Jaguar and Puma (launched by India)
- Tx2 campaign: Launched by WWF; stands for 'Tiger times 2' signaling the goal to double the tiger population by 2022
- National Tiger Conservation authority (NTCA): Constituted under the WPA, 1972
- Project Tiger: Launched in 1973 **™ Tiger Census:** Every 4 years

Tigers In India

- India has the largest population
 - As of 2022, India has 3167 tigers
 - Largest population has been found in Central Indian Highlands & Eastern Ghats Landscape
- Tiger Reserves: India now has 53 tiger reserves
- Ranipur in UP is the latest





 Nagarjun Sagar (Andhra Pradesh) is the largest while Orang (Assam) is the smallest (Core area)
